

## **District Receives High Marks on State Report Card**

A message from Superintendent William Seder Jr.

Mount Vernon City School recently received its state report card based on the 2021-2022 school year. While we realize that the state report card does not tell the whole story of the many wonderful things going on throughout the District, It does give us some valuable academic information.

We are excited to share the results and recognize the outstanding efforts of our students and staff. The new report card system is based on six (6) performance measures, including the following components:

- Achievement This component represents student performance on state tests in grades 3-12.
- Progress This component measures the growth of all students from one year to the next. Meeting one year's worth of growth would receive 3 stars.
- Gap Closing This component measures the reduction in educational gaps between student subgroups. (Students with Disabilities, Economically Disadvantaged, English Language Learners, Ethnicities, etc.)
- K-3 Literacy This component measures reading improvement and proficiency for students in kindergarten through third grade.
- Graduation This component looks at the four and five-year graduation rates when students enter the 9th grade.
- College, Career, Workforce, and Military Readiness

   This component looks at how well prepared our students are for future opportunities, whether training in a technical field or preparing for work or college.

The rating system for each component utilizes a starred rating system from 1-5 stars. The star rating system consists of the following:

The State of Ohio has developed a methodology to compare Similar Districts around Ohio based on a list of factors: Enrollment, Adjusted Gross Income, Economically Disadvantaged, % Adults with College Degrees, and % Population Living in Urban Areas. Mount Vernon City Schools **Ranked #1** among its 20 similar district cohorts . . .

# "Bumping Up" Learning with Ed. Technology

The Mount Vernon City School District Technology Department is continuing to do its part in helping our district "bump up" student learning across the district. Several significant enhancements are

on our horizon. One of these enhancements is to improve our Wi-Fi service to our students and staff. This initiative is made possible by a Federal Program called E-Rate. The main driver of the percentage of government grants MVCSD receives is from our families completing their Free or Reduced Meal Applications. Our current percentage is 80% paid by the Federal Government, with our school district covering 20%. We are thankful for the continued support of parents/guardians filling out these federal applications. This project involves installing Wi-Fi access points in most classrooms and needed network switches to support this service. Our Wi-Fi infrastructure will be dramatically improved, which our students and staff depend on daily.

Another area of improvement focuses on providing our staff with educational technology coaching opportunities to continue to "bump up" student learning. The Ohio Department of Education and National ISTE Technology Standards, along with research from Harvard University and John Hattie, support coaching opportunities for educators. Coaching for teachers includes in-person and virtual sessions on learning about how specific educational tools can enhance teachers' existing lessons.

Teachers have the option of selecting any number of coaching opportunities and can earn college credit or CEUs for their time and efforts



Over the last year and a half, our district has benefited from three approved Federal Emergency Connectivity Fund Grant Applications amounting to \$1.4 million for our school district to improve connectivity on-site and in remote locations. The equipment and services purchased with these funds are independent of our General Operating Funds to provide Wi-Fi access on district buses, purchase new Chromebooks for students in grades 3 – 12, and upgrade Chromebooks for all classroom teachers.

MVCSD recently received approval for the third round of funding of \$236,305.78 through the Federal Emergency Connectivity Fund. This grant will allow us to provide a fixed period of one year of Wi-Fi hotspot service to 678 specific in-need students (as determined by the school district). These Wi-Fi hotspots are the property of Mount Vernon City School District and will continue to be filtered and monitored by our technology department. In addition, we will be able to continue to fund our bus Wi-Fi service through December 2023 without using any General Operating Funds.

The improvements in our technology infrastructure and the instructional coaching tools our teachers receive will all benefit our most important assets.....our students.

# School Health Clinic Opening in 2023

Starting this Spring, Mount Vernon City
Schools students can get the same health care
services they would receive at a doctor's office,
but right at school. A new school-based health
center is opening in the Mount Vernon City
Schools District. In partnership with
Nationwide Children's Hospital and the district,
the school-based health center will provide
additional access to health care. It is open to all
Mount Vernon City Schools students and their
siblings. It is not meant to replace a child's
existing pediatrician but provide help to those
students who do not have a doctor.

"We are excited for this partnership with Mount Vernon City Schools," says Mary Kay Irwin, EdD, senior director of school health services at Nationwide Children's. "We know good health helps a child succeed in school – it's hard to learn if you have to miss class for illness or if you have difficulty concentrating because of a behavioral health concern."

Services offered include:

- Regular checkups (well visits)
- Shots (immunizations)
- Blood work
- Sports physicals
- Help when your child is sick
- Treatment for asthma or diabetes
- Help with work permit physicals
- Treatment for anxiety, depression, and ADHD

Consent from the student's parent/guardian is needed for their child to be seen at the center. Appointments will be available before, during and after school. Walk-in appointments may be available. Parents and guardians are always welcome to be at the visit but don't need to be. Staff will follow up with the parent/ guardian after the visit to explain what took place and any needed follow up.

### **Title I Services**

Title I is a federally funded educational program designed to ensure that all students receive a high-quality education and to assist schools in closing educational achievement gaps. The program provides additional opportunities and resources for all students to acquire the skills outlined in Ohio's Learning Standards for the 2022-2023 school year. Columbia, Dan Emmett, East, Pleasant Street, and Twin Oak Elementary have been designated as schools to be served by the Title I program. All buildings in our district are considered for participation in schoolwide Title I programs. Title I eligible buildings are determined by federal requirements regarding the percentage of low-income children.

MVCSD submits and implements an improvement plan each year to receive Title I funding. Reviews and ongoing monitoring of the effectiveness of Title I building programs are conducted regularly by the Ohio Department of Education. The district's Title I services are multi-factored and include instructional supports, academic intervention, and access to supplemental resources, in addition to our regular classroom instruction, to ensure all students achieve academic success. The ultimate goal of Title I services is to improve academic achievement so that all students meet or exceed state and federal performance standards.

Another essential aspect of Title I is to increase the involvement of parents in a child's education, which is a crucial component of the success of the Title I program. Family involvement opportunities include Annual Title I meetings, School-Family Compact, District and Building Parent Involvement Policy, district/building newsletters, parent-teacher conferences, family nights, volunteer programs, and building-specific events/activities. There are many ways for parents to get involved in their children's education; consider volunteering in their child's school or serving on the school's parent-teacher organization. # Intel's Impact on Mount Vernon City Schools

Intel Corporation's announcement to invest \$20 billion in constructing two new leading-edge microchip factories in Ohio will be transformational not only for Central Ohio but for the United States and the World.

Mount Vernon is located 21 miles from the site where these two factories are currently under construction. Like many communities, we have been asking the question: "How will Intel's investment Impact Mount Vernon?"

#### Here is what we know:

- Intel has committed to constructing two (2) Microchip factories with the potential for an additional six (6) factories in the future.
- Intel will create 3000 high-tech manufacturing jobs at their two factories and another 7000 construction jobs during the build-out phase.
- The Intel ecosystem of suppliers and partners is quite large. Estimates suggest tens of thousands of additional local, long-term jobs may be located in nearby communities around Johnstown.
- The future workforce for Intel, its suppliers, and partners will look for places to relocate businesses and find quality affordable housing.
- The Knox County Area Development Foundation has taken a proactive and thoughtful approach to promote Knox County and Mount Vernon while maintaining its small-town charm and values.
- We know that three (3) Real Estate developers have plans to construct more than 1100 new single-family homes, townhouses, and multi-family residences in the coming years.

## Grants, Gaps, and Gains

The Mount Vernon City School District has and will continue to strive to use pandemic funding granted to school districts to meet the needs of our students, staff, and community. Many of you may know that schools were given "Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief" funds throughout the pandemic. We received our first round of funding during the 2020-21 school year. Initially, we received \$205,117.62 through the Coronavirus Relief Act (CRF). These funds were implemented during the height of the pandemic and were spent on supplies such as plexiglass shields, cleaning supplies, filters, foggers, masks, hand sanitizer, etc. We spent this money directly combating the virus within our schools, and these expenditures fell under the following category: "Purchasing supplies to sanitize and clean facilities of a local educational agency."



Unlike many other districts around the state, Mount Vernon City Schools did not mandate remote learning, with the majority of students attending school regularly during the past couple of years. The second round of relief funds was focused on personnel, programs, and technology.

- Personnel Online Instructors, Social workers, Health Aides, Academic Tutors, Reading Specialists, Technology Director, Behavioral Specialists, and Pandemic Substitutes
- Programs Online curriculum, Intervention programs, Positive Behavior Interventions and Support (PBIS), and after-school programming.
- Technology Replaced and enhanced technology infrastructure, Increased WiFi access (Buildings, Buses, Hotspots), Replaced outdated Chromebooks for staff and students, and updated security cameras in buildings and buses.

These funds fall under the category: "Providing principals and other school leaders with the resources necessary to address the needs of their respective schools."

The final round of relief funding will allow the district to continue many of the aforementioned focus areas, especially those related to personnel. The district will focus the remaining funds on student services and facilities, which covers; "Other activities that are necessary to maintain the operation of and continuity of service in local educational agencies and continuing to employ existing staff of the local educational agency."





- Stabilized deficit spending without the need to eliminate jobs during the pandemic.
- Scholarship for local learning extension programs.
- Credit recovery and summer school programming.
- School-Based Health Center in partnership with Nationwide Children's Hospital.
- Complete facility projects to improve air quality in all buildings. (HVAC/Air Conditioning)
- Replace Doors and Repair Roof structures.
- Replace outdated carpets with tile to improve cleaning and air quality.

We will continue to spend the grant funds received with the utmost care keeping students at the forefront of our decisions while following the state and federal guidelines.

## East Ranks in the Top 50 Schools in Ohio

One of the most exciting discoveries for East Elementary was reviewing the Ohio Department of Education's ranking of schools based on the performance index on our latest Ohio State Report Card. The performance index measures the test results of every student, and schools receive points on the index. The higher the performance level on the state tests, the more points are awarded toward the index score. Out of 3,322 schools in Ohio, East Elementary ranked number 43 with a performance index score of 98.8%, earning 5-stars in all but one category.
