

Building the Future: Facility Planning Committee Announces Key Decisions

A message from Superintendent William Seder Jr.



For the past year, the Facility Planning Committee has been working diligently to assess the state of our school buildings and explore solutions that will provide safe, modern, and efficient learning environments for our students. After seven indepth meetings, multiple school tours, and thorough research, the committee has reached key decisions that will shape the future of our district.

Why Change is Needed

Our schools have been a pillar of the community for generations, but as educational needs evolve and our buildings continue to age, the district must take steps to ensure our facilities support students both now and in the future. Through our research and discussions, the committee identified five key drivers for

change—critical factors that highlight the need for significant facility improvements.

- 1. Aging Buildings & Infrastructure Many of our school buildings have been serving students for decades. While they have been well maintained, they were not designed for modern learning environments. Structural issues, outdated heating and cooling systems, inefficient energy use, and ongoing maintenance costs are becoming major concerns. Without action, these problems will only grow, making it more expensive to maintain outdated facilities.
- 2. Increased Student Needs & Special Services Over the years, the demand for intervention services, special education programs, and mental health support has grown significantly. Many of our schools were not originally built to accommodate these services, creating space limitations and accessibility challenges. Our facilities must evolve to meet the needs of all students, ensuring they have the support and resources necessary to succeed.
- 3. Changing Teaching & Learning Styles Education has transformed dramatically in recent years, with a greater emphasis on technology, hands-on learning, collaborative workspaces, and flexible classroom designs. Unfortunately, many of our current buildings do not support these modern teaching methods. Schools must be designed to foster creativity, problem-solving, and 21st-century skills—preparing students for success beyond the classroom.
- **4. Operational Efficiency & Cost-Effectiveness** Maintaining multiple aging buildings is costly. Utilities, repairs, and upkeep expenses continue to rise, putting a strain on the district's budget. By optimizing our school facilities, we can reduce overall operating costs, making the best use of taxpayer dollars while ensuring students have high-quality learning environments.
- 5. Safety & Security Concerns Student and staff safety is a top priority. While we have taken steps to improve security, many of our buildings were not originally designed with today's safety standards in mind. Schools need secure entrances, improved traffic flow for pickups and drop-offs, updated fire suppression systems, and better emergency response measures. Our facility plan will address these concerns, creating safer schools for everyone.







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Key Decisions and Next Steps

After extensive research and discussion, the committee has made two major decisions regarding the future of our school buildings:

- 1. We will maintain our long-standing K-5 elementary school structure but downsize from six elementary schools to four. Each school will serve approximately 450 students, similar to Twin Oak Elementary, providing equitable learning spaces while maintaining a strong sense of community.
- 2. The Middle School and High School will undergo significant renovations to improve learning spaces, enhance technology, update safety features, and modernize the overall student experience.

These changes will ensure that our schools remain efficient, functional, and future-ready while continuing to meet the needs of students, families, and educators.

A Stronger Future with State Support

To help fund these critical improvements, the committee has decided to partner with the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission (OFCC). The OFCC has worked with over 415 school districts across Ohio, providing expert guidance and funding opportunities to improve school infrastructure.

Through this partnership, the state will contribute 36% of the total cost—an estimated \$50 million in funding. This financial support will significantly reduce the burden on local taxpayers while helping us build the schools our students deserve.

Financial Update

As we plan for the future of Mt. Vernon City Schools, we remain in a stable financial position while closely monitoring budget trends and facility needs. While the district currently maintains a surplus, careful planning is essential, as future projections indicate potential challenges if expenditures outpace revenue by 2029. Enrollment has fluctuated in recent years, impacting funding, though new housing developments may bring future growth. Additionally, Ohio's school funding structure limits revenue flexibility, as property taxes do not adjust for inflation and the state funding formula remains unpredictable.



To address long-term facility needs, the district is exploring a potential bond issue for November 2025 to fund the construction of three new elementary schools. A Facilities Advisory Committee, formed in February, continues to assess options, with about 20 active members working on recommendations. Community engagement meetings are scheduled for April to gather public input.

Thank you for supporting our school district. We remain committed to responsible financial management and strategic planning to best serve our students and community.



Enhancing Student Safety: Wayfinder Technology Improves Our Bus Transportation

At Mount Vernon City Schools, student safety is always our top priority—especially when it comes to transporting children to and from school and athletic events. This year, our Transportation Department has taken another step forward by introducing **Wayfinder**, an advanced navigation system designed to help our bus drivers stay focused on the road.

Wayfinder is a state-of-the-art tablet that provides turn-by-turn voice directions, ensuring drivers have the most accurate routes without needing to glance at printed maps or written instructions. With bus stop locations pinpointed within 10 feet, this system allows our drivers to concentrate fully on the road, making every trip safer for our students.





"This technology has made a huge difference," said veteran bus driver Dave Doup, 'Doupy' . "Before, I had to rely on printed directions or memory, which could be tricky on unfamiliar routes. Now, Wayfinder gives me clear, accurate instructions. I can keep my focus on driving and, most importantly, on the safety of the kids on my bus."

But technology is just one part of our commitment to safety. Our bus drivers undergo extensive training beyond the state's required standards, including monthly safety meetings and hands-on instruction to prepare them for all driving conditions. Behind the scenes, our mechanics conduct daily spot inspections, follow a strict preventative maintenance schedule, and work alongside state inspectors to ensure every bus meets rigorous safety standards.

The roads can be unpredictable, but our dedication to safety is unwavering. With ongoing training, advanced technology, and a team of professionals committed to protecting our students, we are making sure that every ride is a safe one—whether it's to school, a field trip, or the next big game.

State Wrestling Champs!


Ashlynn Brokaw and Alex Taylor became the first-ever individual State Wrestling Champions in MVHS history.

Worthy Wordsmiths: Spotlight on MVMS' Power of the Pen Team

Power of the Pen is an interscholastic writing program for middle school students across Ohio that fosters creativity, critical thinking, and storytelling skills. Mount Vernon Middle School has proudly participated in this program since the 1980s, with a legacy of inspiring young writers to hone their craft.

Students are given 40 minutes to compose an original short story based on a given prompt, challenging them to think quickly and creatively while crafting compelling narratives. After months of practice, students put their skills to the test in tournaments at the district, regional, and state levels, where they are judged on their originality, writing style, and ability to engage readers.

The 2024-2025 Southeast District and Regional tournaments were great successes for Mount Vernon's team. Miriam Vanderhoof, Piper Straight, Anastasia Camillus, and Molly Emig received individual awards for their writing at Districts, with Anastasia and Molly



earning additional accolades at the Regional tournament on March 7. The eighth-grade team's outstanding collaboration and dedication led them to a first-place finish at Districts and second place at Regionals, ultimately securing a third-place overall ranking among competing schools.

Beyond the awards, Power of the Pen provides students with a platform to develop their voice and confidence as writers. "Power of the Pen is significant to me because it lets me become a better writer and express my creative side," said 8th-grade student Vera Holland. Many of her teammates echoed similar sentiments, emphasizing the program's ability to cultivate a love for storytelling and self-expression.



Looking ahead, the team is eager for new opportunities. "We are very excited for our state tournament and looking forward to embracing new writers next year!" shared Anna Camillus, an eighth-grader who has been a key contributor to the team's success. As the team prepares for the state competition, they carry forward the enthusiasm, dedication, and creativity that have made them stand out in the world of competitive writing.
