## Our Expenditures and Services DEFINITIONS

INSTRUCTION are those activities directly dealing with the teaching of pupils or the interaction between teacher and pupil. This includes aides or classroom assistants of any type, who assist in the instructional process. Technology used by the students is also included here.

PUPIL SUPPORT are those activities designed to assess and improve the well-being of pupils and to supplement the teaching process. This includes guidance services, health services, psychological services and support services for students with disabilities.

INSTRUCTIONAL STAFF SUPPORT are those activities associated with assisting the instructional staff with the content and process of providing learning experiences for pupils.

BOARD/ADMINISTRATION/FISCAL are those activities concerned with establishing and administrating policy in connection with operating the school district. This function includes budgeting, receiving and disbursing, financial accounting, payroll, inventory control, auditing and fiscal services rendered by persons in the treasurer's office.

BUSINESS SUPPORT are those activities concerned with directing and managing the business service area.

PLANT OPERATION are those activities concerned with keeping the physical plant open, comfortable and safe for use and keeping the grounds, buildings, and equipment in an effective working condition and state of repair. This includes activities of maintaining safety in buildings, on the grounds and in the vicinity of the schools.


TRANSPORTATION are those activities concerned with the conveyance of individuals to and from school, as provided by state law. It includes transportation to school activities and between home and school.

CENTRAL SUPPORT are those activities, other than general administration, that support each of the other instructional and supporting services programs including planning, research, development, evaluation, information staff, statistical, and data processing services.

EXTRACURRICULAR are those activities under the guidance or supervision of qualified adults that are designed to provide opportunities for pupils to participate in such experiences on an individual basis at school events or public events.

Where the General Fund money comes from




Instruction, Pupil Support and Instructional Staff Support make up 71.73% of the General Fund Expenditures.


#### **PROPERTY TAXES**

Below is a graph depicting the amount of revenues received by the District's General Fund from real and personal property taxes. Property taxes provide a majority of the local revenue to operate and maintain our schools. The District receives property taxes primarily from Knox County. Amounts shown in thousands.



#### STATE FUNDING

The chart below depicts the cash receipts for the District's General Fund from the State of Ohio. Monies received from the State are critical in running a fiscally solvent school district. The four primary components of State revenues are (1) unrestricted State Aid consisting of State Foundation which is a formula calculation based upon student enrollment, (2) property tax allocations which include Homestead and Rollback payments which represent the portion of the tax bill paid by the State instead of the taxpayer, (3) restricted State Aid consisting of economic disadvantaged and career tech funding, and (4) Casino tax revenue to the TPP tax phase-out.
